CONTINUING A LEGACY OF EDUCATION AND SERVICE: Khula's Impact and Initiatives



"Education was an intrinsic part of their mission, ensuring that every person, rich or poor, male or female, of every race, was equipped to flourish and serve in whatever field God called them to." This was said by Phil Anderson about the Moravian communities. In 1938, following the abolition of slavery in the British Empire, the Moravians established the college at Genadendal to train teachers who would in turn be able

to provide formerly enslaved people with an education. (Phil Anderson unpublished notes 2022.) Today 86 years later, we at Khula still believe that education is the way by which God called us to be His hands and feet to the most vulnerable learners in the communities we serve.

We are deeply humbled to share how God has worked through us this term, allowing us to host a prayer week at all the schools where we serve. The heartfelt prayer requests from both children and teachers touched us deeply, reminding us that our work is simply following in His footsteps.

This season has been filled with meaningful initiatives. We celebrated Women's Month with special activities, organised school attendance competitions, and held "Koek en Loer" gatherings to connect with our community. In collaboration with Inceba Trust, we trained teachers for our Tracking the Children project, offering valuable insights and guidance on how to support and assist the children most at risk of dropping out of school. We also collaborated with Nation Builder, KWV, and North-West University to host a successful Social Worker Support Initiative and Journal Club, where social workers earned CPD points. The Legacy Dad programme also from Inceba Trust helped us to reach out to Dads and helped them in their struggles to become good fathers to their children.

We are grateful for the opportunity to serve and continue impacting lives through His grace. Enjoy the read and please remember to keep us in your prayers.

From struggles to a place in a specialised school

Elton Cupido*, a Grade 3 learner, joined our School2Home programme in June 2022, facing significant academic challenges that hindered his participation in daily class activities. His academic difficulties were compounded by a challenging home environment,

characterised by cleanliness issues and his mother's struggle with alcohol addiction. Elton struggled with foundational skills such as reading and writing, and basic tasks like cutting with scissors and pasting were particularly difficult for him. Despite these obstacles, our team committed to providing him with the extra academic support he needed through numerous home visits and classroom interactions.

A year into the programme, Elton's teacher noted his progress with pride, including his newfound ability to cut and paste,

which was celebrated by the class. However, his attendance became inconsistent, partly due to persistent home issues and his mother's reluctance to engage. Our team continued to offer support and encouraged his mother to seek help.

To ensure Elton's educational needs were met, we collaborated with his teacher to assess his suitability for a Learners with Special Education Needs (LSEN) school, and we quickly began the enrolment process. Elton also benefited from weekly Amado animal therapy sessions, which helped build his confidence and improve his attendance. His enthusiasm for learning grew, particularly as he overcame his fear of horses.

Today, we are thrilled to announce that Elton has been accepted into an LSEN school, where he will receive the tailored support necessary to thrive academically. His story highlights the impact of perseverance and dedicated support in transforming lives.
