# **HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST 20 YEARS**

In Khula's early years, we gained invaluable insights. Working closely with a group of young adults aged 17 to 25, we witnessed the devastating impact of school dropout and the vulnerability of children exposed to poverty, violence and gangsterism. At the same time, we engaged with mothers in the community and saw their pain and desperation as they sought help for their children. These experiences profoundly shaped Khula's approach in the years that followed, influencing the way we designed our interventions.

Initially, Khula operated in 23 schools across Paarl and Stellenbosch. Although many children were reintegrated, we couldn't necessarily measure that they stayed in school and progressed to other grades. Academic and behavioural challenges and developmental delays also contributed as push factors that enforced absenteeism.

Before COVID-19, our model included fieldworkers who visited learners' homes to reintegrate them into the school system. These fieldworkers, women from the local community, were driven by a deep passion for transforming their communities and helping vulnerable children leave the streets to build better futures. Despite challenges such as extreme weather, gangsterism, and poverty, they tirelessly gave their best for the children.



COVID-19 hit our world and made it more difficult for children to value education. The protracted school closures during COVID 19 exacerbated disengagement and learners who were high risk were more likely to dropout because of disconnection from school life. As most of our learners had no access to data and therefore receiving homework, Khula advocated for a different learning approach for children living in squatter camps, rural farms etc. These communities, whom already have disadvantages and severe socio-economic challenges to begin with, have been met with even more challenges during the lockdown period. This emphasised the already existing problem of families not having a value for education, when at school or at home, and to participate in school-related activities. There had been a definite disconnection between school, learning and the learners' value for education. Lockdown regulations had not played out equally between the low socio-economic and high socio-economic communities. Khula had therefore amended our mission to promote school attendance where possible and started creating a culture of @homelearning. We started to collaborate with other organisations and the WCED to scale. This initiative led to a new programme of YearBeyond a flagship programme of the Western Cape Youth Development Strategy now driven by the WCED and SCORE.

Post-COVID-19, we strategically scaled down to 9 schools, refining our services to be more specialised. This shift included adding an occupational therapist to our multidisciplinary team, which already included social workers, social auxiliary workers, and educators.

We also introduced training to help teachers and ECD centres identify early risk factors for dropout. Our Play and Learn training program, rooted in the principles of learning through play, empowered educators and community members to create engaging and supportive learning environments. This strategic evolution has enabled us to make a deeper, more focused impact on the children and communities we serve.
